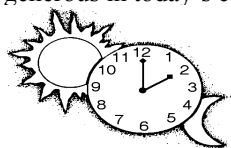

A MESSAGE FROM MSGR. BOB

We are at the midpoint of Lent, and what better reflection than the Gospel for this weekend, the story of the Prodigal Son. Every one of us can relate to each of the characters in this parable. We begin with the father whose love for his sons is unparalleled. He opens his heart in forgiveness and demonstrates the unconditional love that a parent has for a child. We continue with the son who goes his own way and violates everything that is sacred and good in order to satisfy his wants. He finds his way home because he knows that his father will receive him with forgiveness and understanding. And then we hear from the "good" son who stayed at his father's side but grew envious because of his father's love for his brother. We live each of these characters in our everyday dealings with others. The important realization is that in spite of the negative feelings we may have for another and the resentment and jealousy we might feel as a result, there is always room for forgiveness and understanding. We also know that no matter how far away we may choose to wander from God by our choices in life, He is always there to receive us back in compassion and love. This is a powerful source of reflection for each of us this Lent. Take some time this week and meditate on not only our need for forgiveness but also how forgiving and gentle our God is with us.

Happy St. Patrick's Day! We know that St. Patrick, in addition to being the patron saint of the Irish (and those who want to be Irish!), he is also a wonderful example of fidelity to the Lord's ways. His faith gathered many to the heart of Christ. There are many prayers seeking the intercession of St. Patrick, but I think the following is very timely for the world in which we are living today:

- May there be work for your hands to do.
- May your purse always hold a coin or two.
- May the sun always shine on your windowpane.
- May a rainbow be certain to follow each rain.
- May the hand of a friend always be near you.
- May God fill your heart with gladness to cheer you.

We also celebrate the feast of the great St. Joseph this week. Joseph is the patron saint of so many of our needs in life, especially as the patron saint of workers. His role in the life of Christ demonstrates his commitment to the Lord. We can never underplay Joseph's place in salvation history. As Christ's foster father, guide, encourager and teacher, he gave to Jesus a life that was reflective of the need we all have to be responsible members of the society in which we live. We turn in a special way to St. Joseph this year to pray for all who are out of work or facing unemployment, for those not happy with the work they are doing and for those who are actively seeking a job. May Joseph be a source of hope for all of us. As he guided and protected Jesus and Mary, may he be a powerful intercessor for us in our time of need.

Lent invites us to be aware of how alienated and sinful humankind can be, but return is always possible through our Lord, Jesus Christ. Looking to Christ means looking with faith and repentance. Our Holy Father has said: "The grace of the sacrament of Penance supports and nourishes the commitment to be faithful disciples of the Lord." The theme for the diocesan Lenten Confession Campaign comes from the Scriptures that tell us over and over again to be reconciled to God. Whether you have received the Sacrament of Penance a few months ago or 25 or more years ago, you are invited to come and be reconciled! Confession is available in every parish in the Diocese of Bridgeport on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 until 9:00 p.m. Take advantage of this wonderful opportunity for grace and forgiveness.

CONGRATULATIONS TO LYNDA AND JIM HEALEY! Each year at the Diocesan White Mass for those committed to the healing of the sick, five individuals are honored who

demonstrate their willingness to extend Christ's grace to those who are ill. This couple is no stranger to that call from Jesus as they travel regularly to the nursing home to bring the Eucharist, prayers, and happiness to the residents and patients. They spend almost their entire Sunday afternoon visiting and lifting the spirits of those they visit. Children of Light

This is what we are called – Children of Light – what an incredible description of us. We may not think in those terms; rather we may think about ourselves – Children of Semi-Darkness – Children Striving to be Light – and even: Children in the Dark. Yet, in today’s second reading, St. Paul reminds us that yes, we were once in darkness; however now we “are light in the Lord. Live as children of light.” We are warned to avoid the things done in secret – because it will all be brought to light. This is why Lent is such a powerful spiritual time of growth for us. It calls us beyond limited humanity and into the light of Christ. Light produces “every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth.”

Reflection Question: Ask God to reveal to you the things that you do in “secret” – things that you are not proud of -- that you do not want brought to light. Clear out the cluttered dark corners of your life by asking Him to help you live in truth and goodness as we draw ever closer to His heart this Lent. Pray: “Lord, My Father, I want to come home to you, and I want to live totally in and with you because I am a child of the light. Amen.”

Reflection Activity: If possible, attend Spiritual Journey on Thursday, March 18 from 10:15-11:15, to reflect on your spiritual journey this Lent. (See details below)

Respect All Life Prayer Service for Seventh Graders and Their Parents On Monday, March 15 from 7:00-8:30 n.m. we will meet in the Church where we will hear from three guest speakers about the value of our lives and those around us. NYC Detective McDonald is one of the speakers - his life was drastically changed as the result of a gunshot wound: he sneaks about how God has continually been present to him and helped him through his life. A father and son will also give a witness story about how life can be affected by addiction, and how wholeness is made possible through God. The evening concludes with a prayer service for all life issues. Detective McDonald does not accept an honorarium; however we take a free-will collection for his charity of choice: American Special Children's Pilgrimage Group.

It is hard to give to others if we are running on empty. On **March 18 at 7:00**, all catechists are asked to attend a general catechist meeting in the gathering hall. As teachers of the faith, we must be filled in order to give to the children we serve. Sixth Grade Seder Celebrations

Sixth graders will celebrate a hands-on instructional Seder during this week. During sixth grade, students learn about Hebrew Scripture and our covenant with God as His people – these are our roots in faith. First Communion Preparation Session

During March 21-24, all children celebrating their First Communion this year will meet in the parish hall with their parents. This is part of what the diocese refers to as “Immediate Parish Preparation” for Celebration of the Sacrament. The students learned about the need for irrigation systems for Ethiopia – helping people to help themselves in their farming. The worldwide statistic is that 1.8 million children die each year because of lack of clean water (and many more live with health problems). Be mindful of water – remind your children to thank God for this valuable resource each time they turn on the faucet. The students also learned about Catholic Social Teaching: that all people have the four basic rights to: life, water, food, and shelter, and we are called to share with those who are lacking these basic rights. Each week during Lent, the catechists will be collecting the students’ donations. Thank you for your generosity.

When preparing medication for yourself, a child or a loved one, keep in mind the 5 Rights to assure the medication is taken safely.

THE 5 RIGHTS

1. Right Drug: carefully check the name.
2. Right Dose: check the amount
3. Right Time: check a clock
4. Right Frequency: is it to be taken once a day, twice a day, etc.
5. Right Route: is it to be swallowed like a pill, applied to the skin, is it eye drops?

Following the 5 Rights helps avoid dangerous medication mistakes.

They have assisted young mothers with the births of over 1,000 babies, and conducted nearly 700 hundred educational presentations in schools and clubs, including a presentation to parents of 7th and 8th grade religious education students here at St. Rose. They have logged over 140,000 hours on the 24hr/7days a week hot line. They spent hundreds of hours in their "Earn while you learn" program, an eight week program for young mothers and fathers on birthing and parenting skills.
